


The book includes a comprehensive bibliography of primary and secondary sources on the Great War and its memory.



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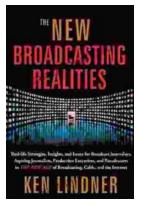
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
